Pastor's Note

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. ² So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." ...¹¹ But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look^[a] into the tomb, ¹² and she saw two angels in white sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. ¹³ They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." ¹⁴ When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. ¹⁵ Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." ~John 20:1-2, 11-15 NRSVUE

Resurrection morning begins in the wilderness. The followers of Jesus are lost, overwhelmed with grief, afraid...their world has collapsed into chaos. Mary of Magdala goes early to the tomb as soon as the Sabbath is over. Other gospel accounts tell of several women accompanying Mary so that together they may grieve and finish preparing Jesus' body for burial. On finding Jesus' body missing, panic joins the horrible emotions filling the women, and soon the other followers of Jesus. Who would take his body? What are they going to do? Have they truly lost everything? Is it any wonder Mary fails to recognize Jesus' newly resurrected body? The wilderness she finds herself in is dark, maybe even darker than the seven demons Jesus pulled her away from. Stumbling in the darkness of grief and loss, pain and panic, she perceives through all her tears a possible gardener tending the area and seeks any help she can get in locating the body of her beloved teacher.

In the midst of such a wilderness, the last thing Mary or any of Jesus' followers expected was a resurrection story! New life, resurrected life greets Mary in her wilderness and shines the light of hope into the gloom surrounding her.

As we move from the wilderness of Lent, we spend 50 days in the glorious season of Easter—the Great 50 days—which ends at Pentecost. We know that the wilderness of our world does not cease on April 20th. However, the Easter season is a time of celebrating all the ways in which resurrection is possible in our lives even in the midst of the wilderness. We can be in need of rising out of the depth of imprisonment, addiction,

poverty, illness and oppression—not just physically and literally, but also spiritually. What keeps us locked up inside? What holds us back from the joy of life? What binds us, keeping us form the fullness of who God created us to be? Perhaps our Easter Celebrations will help us find the key to unlock joy, to reclaim our glory(!), and help us shine the light of hope in a wilderness world. The Great 50 Days! Pastor Paul's Note

"It is good to have an end to journey toward; but it is the journey that matters, in the end."

All journeys have to end; there is a finish point that we all come to. For me, one of the most important aspects of hiking is how I get to the end.

Sometimes, when I'm not really feeling it, it feels like I am just trudging through the woods, looking for trail markers and anticipating the end. I get tired and the walk seems monotonous. Last weekend was an example of that. I was in Mariposa State Forest (south of Deruyter area). There was still quite a bit of snow in the woods and I post-holed quite a bit and fell a few times. The first mile or so was straight up a hill, and I wasn't really ready for that. My feet were wet and getting cold; I honestly couldn't wait until I got to the end of my section so I could turn back and get to my truck. This walk was only 4.5 miles, but it seemed to take me forever.

More often though, I let the woods engulf me and feel the presence of trees and wind and birds and life. The journey can be long and arduous, but I don't mind the walking and it becomes a rhythm for me. I get into a cadence and escape the reality of the world. It is in those moments that I really begin to feel the presence of God and allow myself to open my mind and my soul to the Spirit. Some of my walks have been close to 10 miles, and the time seems to go by so quickly, although several hours may have passed.

The journey matters. How I look at the journey matters. What my mindset is when I start the journey matters. The goal that I have for the journey matters.

I think those thoughts are true for all of us. How do we look at our journey? What is our mindset beginning the journey? What is the goal?

Our journey through Lent is coming to a close. For some, I bet this journey may be like my experience a few weeks ago— can't wait for it to be over. But, I know for many, the journey through Lent has been like many of my walks—lovely and beautiful and spiritual.

But, is the journey really over? Is there really an end to this journey we are on? Yes, Easter is the end of our Lenten journey. Yes, my (almost) weekly hikes end—but as soon as I get home and unpack, I begin looking for my next journey! Our journey doesn't end at Easter; Easter is but a pause—a joyous and beautiful pause—but the journey continues! Where will our next journey take us? What post- resurrection stories will we see and be part of? What sightings of the resurrected Christ will we have? In what direction will the resurrected Christ point us?

Are you ready for more journeying? I am. And I know Pastor T and I will journey with you.


We are reminded of summer as the weather is getting warmer and the flowers begin to bloom. Summer will bring some fun community events for Central and our neighbors.

Garden Project

Spring brings gardening to mind! I can't wait to get out in the dirt! I love the smell of fresh, warm dirt. We have a great opportunity for all of us to smell like dirt!

Central is working with Broome County Cooperative Extension to build 8 raised bed gardens on the parsonage lawn. The gardens will be 4 feet x 8 feet. The materials will be dropped off at Central and we will work together to build and place the boxes. Soil will be delivered and then we will begin planting seeds and seedlings. The produce from these garden beds will be used for Shepherd's Supper and given to the Clothing Center to distribute to their guests.

We are so excited about this opportunity to help feed our neighbors!!



We continue to tweak, optimize, and adjust from week to week to improve the reliability and longevity of the current components. Two instrument microphones have been added to the inventory providing optimal and simultaneous use of four microphones for the bells, one microphone for the trumpet when recording and one microphone for Livestreaming.

The Tech Team Youth/Young Adult Interns persist in sharpening their skills and becoming more proficient as do the adults that work with them. Several volunteers ensure that post-editing the service for broadcast on Spectrum cable goes well.

One drawback is that there is only one person practiced at collating and organizing the service information used by the Tech Team to prepare for services. This preparation requires no technical expertise and can be done from home. Feel free to contact me through the office or at the booth on Sunday mornings to learn more about how to assist the Tech Team with service preparation.

As always, TV Ministry is grateful to the Shalom Committee for undergirding this ministry and appreciates the support from Central's members and friends so that this vital outreach can continue.
