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Pastor's Note

The Message is as true among you today as when you first heard it. It doesn't diminish or weaken over time. It's the same all over the world. The Message bears fruit and gets larger and stronger, just as it has in you. From the very first day you heard and recognized the truth of what God is doing, you've been hungry for more.

~ Colossians 1:5-6, The Message



The Apostle Paul opens his letter to the church at Colossae with wonderful words of praise and thanksgiving, for the congregation and for the work God in Christ is doing through them. At the same time, Paul seeks to give the congregation encouragement and motivation to continue to move forward in exploring all that Jesus lived and taught, and the call God is placing on their lives. Paul seeks to build a community of faith explorers, those who want to learn more and more about the wonders of God and what faith means for their day-to-day lives.

Paul's words are also for us, 2000 years later in North America. Paul urges us to be a community that is constantly learning, constantly deepening their faith and understanding, and constantly putting that faith into action in serving our community and world. Pastor Paul's Sunday School class is a great source of learning and I hear weekly of the wonderful conversations and exploration that happens in that space. Some have even suggested that Sunday School not take a break for the summer. Paul the Apostle would be thrilled to hear such news!

For our summer months when we come together in one service at 9:30 am (June, July & August), let's go on an adventure! One that the Apostle Paul would be overjoyed to hear about. But Pastor Paul and I need your input. What do you wish we could explore as a church together? What topics have you wanted to hear addressed in the congregation? What theological issues would you like to explore? Let Pastor Paul and I know. Write it in the pew pad on Sunday, drop it on the slips of paper available at the tech booth, send one of the pastors a text or email, call the office or drop on by. Pastor Paul and I will take all these topics and suggestions and develop worship for the summer months. After worship each week, we will have a time of discussion in the lounge for anyone who would like to explore further.

We cannot promise to have all the answers. No one does. But we will lift up your topic, spend time exploring scripture, and come together in conversation each week. Pastor Paul and I echo the Apostle Paul's words to the Colossian Church:

Our prayers for you are always spilling over into thanksgivings. We can't quit thanking God our Father and Jesus our Messiah for you! We keep getting reports on your steady faith in Christ, our Jesus, and the love you continuously extend to all Christians. The lines of purpose in your lives never grow slack, tightly tied as they are to your future in heaven, kept taut by hope.



2025 Annual Conference of the People of Upper **New York**

The annual gathering of the Upper New York Conference (UNY) of the United Methodist Church (UMC)—our conference—will be held in Syracuse at the Oncenter from Thursday, May 22-Saturday, May 24. Central Church is represented by both our pastors—Teressa and Paul—and by two members of the congregation—Beverly Cosimano and Sarah Hungerford, All UMC conferences must be made up of equal numbers of clergy and laity. While we are gathered at the Oncenter, we will worship, learn, fellowship, and vote. Here a little of what we will be doing.



2025 Upper New York Annual Conference

The 2020-2024 General Conference passed several proposed amendments to the Constitution of The United Methodist Church. These unique pieces of legislation only become official once they are ratified by a two-thirds affirmative vote of the aggregate majority of members to the annual conferences across the global denomination. Four items of business relating to General Conference will be presented to the 2025 Upper New York Annual Conference, and each one will be handled as four separate ballots/votes. Along with these amendments, the UNY Conference will also vote on membership of the many conference teams and committees, clergy salary minimums, pensions and benefits for clergy and conference staff, the budget for our conference, churches that have closed, missional goals for the conference, and several resolutions on such topics as welcoming migrants, apartheid in the Holy Lands, and much more.

TV Ministry replaced an aging microphone to help ensure trouble-free operation and smooth worship experiences. The electronics' software is continually monitored and upgraded when needed.

The breadth and depth of the church's electronic outreach continues to grow. When we began LiveStreaming in 2019 it was a stretch to secure 100 subscribers so we could meet YouTube's requirements for a reliable channel. We now have <u>429</u> subscribers. This is a remarkable achievement and one that has happened without "campaigning" on our part.

In addition to LiveStreams of weekly worship services, a recent funeral received over <u>200</u> views, including some from Europe. In the past we have had worshipers from Turkey, the Caribbean, and the African continent as well. Central is doing its best to fulfill the call to spread the Good News.

This is a testament to the Youth and Young Adult Interns who operate the equipment on a regular basis and to the adults who support them and care for pre- and post-service responsibilities. And it is possible because of the support and encouragement of the Trustees, Shalom Fund, and the Central's members and friends. We are grateful.

A Prayer for Mothering Sunday

We often forget the radical roots of Mother's Day. Far from being an intimate celebration of family life, Mother's Day had its origin in work for justice and peace.

It all started in the 1850s, when West Virginia women's organizer Ann Reeves Jarvis held Mother's Day work clubs to improve sanitary conditions and try to lower infant mortality by fighting disease and curbing milk contamination, according to historian Katharine Antolini of West Virginia Wesleyan College. The groups also tended wounded soldiers from both sides during the U.S. Civil War from 1861 to 1865.

In the postwar years Jarvis and other women organized Mother's Friendship Day picnics and other events as pacifist strategies to unite former foes. Julia Ward Howe, for one—best known as the composer of "The Battle Hymn of the Republic"—issued a widely read "Mother's Day Proclamation" in 1870, calling for women to take an active political role in promoting peace.

Around the same time, Jarvis had initiated a Mother's Friendship Day for Union and Confederate loyalists across her state. But it was her daughter Anna who was most responsible for what we call Mother's Day—and who would spend most of her later life fighting the limitation and sentimentality of what it had become.

This service was originally written for a year when Mothers' Day fell on the Festival of Pentecost; its prayer to the Spirit seems appropriate for any time!

On the day of Pentecost, followers of Jesus gathered, including many women:

Mary, the mother of Jesus,
Mary Magdalene, Mary and Martha,
Salome, Susanna, Joanna,
the Canaanite woman and her daughter,
the Samaritan woman, Philip's four daughters,
Peter's mother-in law,
women who had been healed or touched by Jesus
and many, many more.

As the Spirit fell upon them, all hearts were opened and they began to prophesy: Some used the utterance of wisdom, another the gift of knowledge, others became healers and interpreters of tongues. All used their gifts for the common good. In the presence of the Spirit, in the power of Pentecost love, they proclaimed a vision of God's shalom.

Today, we remember the women of history who have been moved by the Spirit to proclaim and live out God's vision of peace with justice:

(Lift up the names of women who have worked for justice and peace to honor on this Mother's Day)

On this Mother's Day, let us lift up the names of people in our own lives who have mothered us and witnessed to us the power of love and the Spirit:

(Lift up the names of people who have nurtured your life and educated you in faith)

As it happened on the day of Pentecost, let the Spirit come upon us as we go about our ministry together, today and always. Amen.
